



2013 Freshman Cohort Non-returning Students: What do we know?

Executive Summary

The following report provides an analysis of 528 first-time full-time degree seeking freshmen in the University of South Alabama (USA) 2013 freshman cohort who did not return to USA in Fall 2014. Of these non-returning students, 220 (42%) transferred to another institution prior to Fall 2014 and 308 (58%) “stopped out” or did not enroll in another college or university.

- Results indicated a large majority of transfer students transferred to another institution with one or more of the following characteristics: public, a two year institution, and/or located in Alabama, with the majority (55%) transferring to a community college.
- Findings showed a large percentage based differential between students who “stopped out” with a USA GPA of 2.0 or lower (36%) or students with less than six hours earned at USA (20%) and students who transferred and had a similar USA GPA or a similar number of USA earned hours.
- Indicators for students at greater risk to “stop out” instead of transferring to another institution included students of local origin from Mobile or Baldwin County (27%), placed on probation after Fall 2013 (23%), living off campus (21%), receiving a JagAlert in multiple courses in Fall 2013 (19%), and also male students (13%).

Overview

The following report provides an analysis of 528 first-time full-time degree seeking freshmen in the University of South Alabama (USA) 2013 freshman cohort who did not return to USA in Fall 2014. The National Student Clearinghouse (NSC) was used to identify whether non-returning students transferred to another institution or “stopped out” and did not enroll in another higher education institution in Fall 2014. While the preference is for students to return and persist at USA, a student who transferred to another institution could be considered a secondary measure of student success.

More than 3,600 colleges and universities in the United States participate in the NSC. With NSC participating institutions enrolling over 98% of all students in public and private colleges and universities in the United States, students who were not identified as transfer students by the NSC were unlikely to be enrolled at another college or university and had “stopped out” of higher education. This report provides comparisons between 220 non-returning students who transferred to another institution prior to Fall 2014 and 308 non-returning students who “stopped out” and did not enroll at another college or university.

Where Non-returning Students Transferred

Of the 220 non-returning students who transferred, a large majority transferred to an institution with one or more of three characteristics (see Table 1 and Table 2). The transfer institution was likely: 1) public (93%), 2) a two year institution (55%), and/or 3) located in Alabama (61%). Mississippi (17%) and Florida (7%) were also a likely transfer destination of the non-returning students.

The most common two year transfer institutions of choice (see Table 3) were Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College (25), Faulkner State Community College (18), and Shelton State Community College (11). Of the four year universities, University of Alabama (13), Pensacola State College (8), and Auburn University at Montgomery (7) were the most common transfer destination.

Comparison of Non-returning Transfer Students to Students Who “Stopped Out”

Multiple characteristics of non-returning students were compared to determine what characteristics showed a large percentage based differential between 308 non-returning students who “stopped out” compared to 220 non-returning students who transferred. The following table displays characteristics with a percentage based differential of 12% or greater between students who transferred and students who “stopped out” (see Table 4 or complete data tables found in the Appendix).

Results showed the USA GPA (first) and the number of USA earned hours (fifth) were two of the seven characteristics with subgroups that showed the greatest differential between non-returning students who “stopped out” and students who transferred.

- 72% of the non-returning students who “stopped out” had a USA GPA of 2.0 or lower (205) compared to 36% of non-returning students who transferred (76) and 18% of the non-returning students who transferred had a USA GPA of 3.01 to 3.5 (37) compared to 5% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (14).
- 36% of non-returning students who “stopped out” completed zero to six USA earned hours (104) compared to 16% of non-returning students who transferred (33) and 20% of non-returning students who transferred had 24.5 to 30 USA earned hours (43) compared to 7% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (19).

The region where the student originated from was the characteristic with the second greatest percentage based differential between non-returning students who “stopped out” and non-returning students who transferred. Students who originated from Mobile or Baldwin County were much more likely to “stop out” than to transfer to another institution.

- 54% of non-returning students who “stopped out” came from Mobile or Baldwin County (166) compared to 27% of non-returning students who transferred (59).
- 44% of non-returning students who transferred came from the rest of Alabama (97) compared to 28% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (85).

Four other characteristics showed a percentage based differential greater than or equal to 12% between students who “stopped out” and students who transferred. These other four characteristics were: 1) probation status after Fall 2013, 2) housing, 3) number of JagAlerts received in Fall 2013, and 4) gender.

- 57% of non-returning students who “stopped out” were placed on probation after Fall 2013 (177) compared to 34% of non-returning students who transferred (74).
- 55% of non-returning students who “stopped out” lived off campus (168) compared to 34% of non-returning students who transferred (74).
- 58% of non-returning students who “stopped out” received a JagAlert in Fall 2013 in multiple courses (179) compared to 39% of non-returning students who transferred (86) and 33% of the non-returning students who transferred did not receive a JagAlert in Fall 2013 (72) compared to 21% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (64).
- 51% of non-returning students who “stopped out” were male (157) compared to 38% of non-returning students who transferred (84).

Implications

Results showed a large percentage based differential between students who “stopped out” with a USA GPA of 2.0 or lower (36%) and students who completed zero to six USA earned hours (20%) compared to non-returning students who transferred. These students may have benefited from programs such as intrusive advising and peer mentoring to improve their odds of persistence at USA or to prepare them to transfer to another institution. While the preference is to encourage USA freshmen students to continue and persist at USA, a student who successfully transfers to another institution could also be considered a secondary measure of success compared to a complete “stop out” from higher education.

Early indicators for students at greater risk to “stop out” instead of transferring to another institution included students of local origin from Mobile or Baldwin County (27%), living off campus (21%), receiving a JagAlert in multiple courses during their first fall semester (19%), and also male students (13%). Students with these characteristics were less likely to transfer to another institution and should be targeted early with interventions to help them persist and return to USA.
